Chapter 25: Building Permits

§ 25-1 Issuance application.

A

All building permits shall be issued by the Building Inspector or the Acting Building Inspector pursuant to and in accordance with §1203.3 of the New York State Uniform Fire Prevention and Building Code for any and all work described in that section including, but not limited to, §1203.3(b) and any concrete or blacktop flat work.

Chapter 48: Grading and Storm Water Management

§ 48-3 Submittal of plan.

A. (1)

The applicant shall pay to the City Clerk a fee of \$120 at the time the application is submitted, to cover the cost of reviews and inspections required by this article.

Chapter 81: Streets

Article IV: Road Cut Fees, Sidewalk Replacement and Terrace Restoration

§ 81-10 Fees.

A.

An application for street opening as provided for in $\S 81-1$ shall be accompanied by a fee, to be deposited by the applicant with the City Treasurer in the following sums:

One hundred fifty dollars for any pavement cut.

(2)
Two dollars and fifty cents per square foot for any sidewalk cut.

(3) One hundred dollars **per foot** per curb section for any curb cut.

§ 81-12 Pavement and sidewalk restoration and maintenance.

The Permittee shall be responsible for the restoration or replacement of all pavement and sidewalk surfaces to the satisfaction of the Superintendent of Public Works. Such restoration must be completed within ten (10) days of the completion of the permitted work.

Chapter 81: Streets

Article V: Curb Openings for Driveways

§ 81-16 Permit requirements; fee and conditions.

One curb cut shall be allowed per residential parcel. Such curb cut shall be made by means of saw cut only. It shall be the duty of every person, firm or corporation constructing a driveway from a premises to a street to cut the curb in front of such premises so as to permit proper ingress and egress by means of the driveway. No person, firm or corporation shall remove, lower or otherwise alter a street curbing for the purpose of installing a driveway entrance on any of the streets or alleys within the City of North Tonawanda, New York, without written permission first being obtained from and registration with the City Engineer. All such work done by the permittee shall conform to the latest construction standards and inspection requirements promulgated by the Department of Engineering as specified in the permit for curb openings for driveways. All persons are hereby forbidden from placing any temporary or permanent obstruction in the gutters of any street or alley for the purpose of passing over uncut curblines or for any other purpose.

§ 81-17 Penalties for offenses.

Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be responsible for the replacement of the defective work and/or be subject to a fine not to exceed \$100 for each offense.

Chapter 103: Zoning

§ 103-14 Off-street parking.

B(1)(f) Driveway Design:

- (1) No driveway shall be placed or constructed that exceeds in width one-third (1/3) of the total frontage of the parcel on which it is constructed or placed, but in no event shall the width exceed twenty (20) feet.
- (2) No driveway shall be placed or constructed as to exceed the opening width of the parcel's garage door by more than two (2) feet, but in no event shall the width of said driveway exceed twenty (20) feet.
- (3) No driveway apron shall be so placed or constructed as to exceed the width of the parcel's driveway by more than (3) feet, unless said apron is replacing an existing apron in kind. No apron shall be so placed or constructed so as to cross any projected property line.
- (4) The widening of any existing driveway or driveway apron requires review and issuance of a grading permit by the City Engineer subject to the provisions of Chapter 48 of The Code
- (5) Must comply with all city of North Tonawanda flat work codes and regulation including, but not limited to, §§ 25, 48 and 81.

- (6) The placement or construction of any required parking lots in any C or M
 District pursuant to this chapter shall be subject to approval and the issuance of a
 grading permit by the City Engineer subject to the provisions of Chapter 48 of The
 Code.
- Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to a fine not to exceed \$100 for each offense.

§ 103-15 Supplemental Regulations

C. Area and yards

4 (d). Have the aggregate ground area for all accessory **structures**, **paved or concrete areas exceed 30%** of the required rear yard in any R District or 40% of any required rear yard in any C District or **M District**.

My office was contacted by the Water Department regarding an update to the Water Code (Article 98) for a number of changes and/or clarifications to be made. Those requested changes are attached to this correspondence.

A change was made to Section 98-2 (I) and 98-6 (B) to correspond with what the current protocol is with the Water Department. Section 98-6 (A) was changed to add in testing requirements for a new meter size. Finally, to clarify the procedure for violations of this Chapter, after a violation notice is sent by the Water Department, the Building Department will thereafter be responsible for enforcing compliance.

§ 98-2. Conditions of service.

I. At any premises, water may must be turned off or on by a plumber licensed in North Tonawanda who has obtained the proper permit of, In the case of emergency, by a representative of the Water Department may turn off the water.

§ 98-6. Testing of meters.

A. All City-owned meters are tested for accuracy of registration at flow rates and test flow quantities in accordance with the AWWA Standard C705 before installation. To ensure reliable meter measurements, all privately owned meters must be tested periodically and must comply with AWWA Standard C705. A test certificate must be filed with the Water Department. The City may require the following frequency of testing:

B. A **city** meter may be tested at the request of a property owner without charge, if the test reveals that the meter is not within the limits of accuracy according to the standards of the American Water Works Association. For service, a fee of \$55 will be charged if the **city** meter is found to be within the limits of accuracy. The property owner shall be billed for meter testing within the first water bill rendered after the date of such test.

§ 98-14. Penalties for offenses.

Any person, firm or corporation violating any provisions of this chapter, to include tampering with the meter, shall be fined not less than \$250 nor more than \$1,000 for each offense. The Building Inspector and Code Enforcement Officer shall be responsible for enforcing compliance with this chapter.

AUDIENCE PARTICIPATION

<u>Jean Kroetsch 465 Witmer Road</u> – Asked if the water code changes affect all the residents, and does it give the City a little more leverage when enforcing the code. Asked if the Council could explain the changes to chapter 48 and do they affect all resident. Said she would like to submit a letter that she has written describing a great job the City Fire Department and EMTs did.

<u>Dennis O'Sullivan 192 Walter Drive</u> – Asked if he could have an update on the Donnor Creek issue and street lights on Walter Drive. Stated he paid \$7,500 in taxes and is not able to use his whole yard. Said he thinks a pipe should be put in his yard for the water to sit in the pipe until the easement issue can be fixed.

Kristen O'Sullivan 192 Walter Drive — Said it is a hazard in her backyard. Said her beef is with the other people who are preventing water drainage, at this point because they are not signing the easement they can do what they want in their yards but we can't. Said that she purchased her home with the knowledge of it having a retention pond on it, and the purpose of this pond is to hold water until it drains. Stated she has been in contact with the Mayor and City Engineer for the past four to five years. Said that the DEC has stated that this is unacceptable. Said she is paying taxes to have a full lot when she cannot use a third of the yard. Asked the City to grant her a tax credit on the unused part of her yard. Stated that she had to put up a fence around the yard. Said that she doesn't think that she is being unreasonable in requesting updates. Said it is a hazard for her kids and any kids in the neighborhood, the City needs to have another solution until the easements are signed.

Walter Yaro 170 Christiana Street – Said that it is kind of interesting the City designates the North Tonawanda Extra as an official paper but they advertise in the Niagara Gazette. Said the reason he was at the meeting was because of Article 7 of the City Code, better known as Terrace Parking, specifically section 96.61 Preexisting Paved Terrace, the City needs to tear up in front of 185 Bryant Street, it has been paved illegal for 10 years. Wants to speak to his Alderman to do something about it. Stated it is not the City's problem that he doesn't have parking it is the landlords problem.

Sonia Dusza 123 Miller Street – Stated to City Attorney Katie Alexander, Walt Yaro just gave an example of what she has been saying, is that we do not have code enforcement as a regular thing in the City. Asked Alderwoman Braun, your husband is chairman of the Zoning Board so she would know that if a person wants to have tenants they must provide enough parking for them, Mr. Yaro is absolutely right, it is not his problem, or the tenant, it is the landlords problem. Stated that decades ago people had to get permits to cut the curb, this is nothing new. Stated she sees Police Chief and sees Larry Kuebler and thinks friends and family, same old retreads again and again. Asked if the City is putting in the same people and do people realize that this job was available. Said that applying for the grant to get the new band shell sounds like a great idea, it is something for all the people. Stated that River Road has become a concrete junk yard; it should be a scenic route, the City needs a Planner.
