MAYOR PAPPAS – STATE OF THE CITY ADDRESS

My fellow citizens, members of the Common Council, members of the press and guests, it is an honor and a privilege to stand before you and report on the state of our City. As you are aware, this has been an unusual past few months for our city government. Our former Mayor becoming our State Senator for this district, I becoming Mayor, and council seats have changed along with our new City Clerk-Treasurer. I have been in office only one month, but I am happy to report that the City of North Tonawanda is in good shape. I will elaborate on this statement after I explain that this is the result of the work of the former administration of now Senator Ortt. I can't emphasize enough how fantastic Rob was in ensuring a smooth transition to me. I want to thank those involved with Senator Ortt's administration that helped with this process, including Scott Kiedrowski, Council members, Assistant Bob Welch, and many others.

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As I mentioned before, the state of our City is strong and vibrant. For many years, it seems as if ideas were brainstormed, plans drawn up, experts consulted, committees formed, studies made with little to show for all of this. Everything was abstract. However, now one has only to look about town to see actual, tangible results. There is now a vibrancy, an excitement, a new pride as we experience a "mini renaissance" in North Tonawanda. New businesses have arrived in our City, jobs are starting to be created, and people are beginning to look to North Tonawanda as a possible place to start a business or possibly take up residence.

Our downtown has taken on a new life and is bustling almost nightly. What a difference from just a few short years ago when things were starting to look like a ghost town. Now there is day-life and night-life (restaurants, stores of different varieties, and the theater). Why? Because of the hard work of city officials and volunteers from the community and those business people who saw the potential of our great City and have taken risks and invested in North Tonawanda. Interested parties are inquiring more and more about investing in our City, not just downtown, but along Niagara Falls Boulevard, Erie Avenue, Meadow Drive, Payne Avenue, and yes, Oliver Street.

As we continue to strive for economic growth and encourage entities to invest in our community, we must remember that North Tonawanda must invest in itself. No part of the City can be neglected. Every area must be cared for whether residential or commercial.

Having been in office for only 33 days has provided me with little time to advance new projects, but it has allowed me to acquaint myself with the department heads, union leaders, City employees, and many boards and committees of various organizations. My first goal has been to establish a working relationship with so many individuals who make the City run smoothly. I feel time spent with these individuals was time well spent.

As I mentioned earlier, we are in a "mini renaissance" in North Tonawanda. Therefore, another goal is to complete projects still underway. To continue moving forward the next several years, we need to zero in on our infrastructure. We still have areas of the city with flooding problems, especially during severe storms which put pressure on our water and sewer systems. Measures have been taken and will continue to take place to help alleviate these problems. Funds have been provided to install emergency backup generators for four of our sewage pump stations. Aging water main replacements have been made with PVC replacement, and more are in the plans. Storm sewer separation has taken place in certain sections of the City where storm and sanitary systems were combined, and the City is continuing efforts to alleviate this concern in 2015.

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Roads are always a topic of discussion, and it needs to be. This is one of the main complaints in the City. Recently, approximately 3 million dollars in street repairs have been made with more than 30 miles of streets being resurfaced. Many things have taken their toll on our roads, but our Department of Public Works will be again working diligently to continue what needs to be done to make more of our roads user friendly. Brad Rowles and the team of employees at the Department of Public Works are ready to go when the weather permits. This process will continue under this administration. Along with road repair, there will be projects to repair or replace sidewalks throughout parts of the City. This, in certain areas, has become urgent and is being addressed.

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The work on the Erie Canal bike path extension will begin this year. This project will involve the current path that runs along Sweeney Street and it will be extended from Payne Avenue to Mayor's Park. Another project that involves the Erie Canal will be the installation of three kayak dock sites at Botanical Gardens, Service Drive, and Gateway Harbor Park by the Renaissance Bridge. These projects are being funded through bonding, grants, state aid, along with our own budget. As we look forward to extending our bike path, it is important to note the economic impact bicyclists can have on our city. They support our businesses and bring other events to town.

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There are needed repairs at the water plant. The pumping station roof is badly in need of replacement. The projected cost is \$100000 and we are proposing that amount be bonded as well as \$60,000 for the water plant improvements. In addition to upgrades at the water plant, the sewer plant facility is also being upgraded to protect our water supply. These improvements are needed for efficient and effective operation.

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Several of the topics that I have mentioned come under Public Safety, which I consider of prime importance and the responsibility of government. Having attended emergency management training recently, I have gained further respect for those who are our first responders in the line of defense during times of tragedy or various emergency situations. Working with Police Chief Hall and Fire Chief Lapham is critical for their direction in times of emergency and everyday situations in our City. As many have noticed, the new communication tower located next to Fire headquarters will be a critical element to our safety in the event of a disaster in our community. I am very proud of the professionalism of our Police and Fire departments and how visible they have become in recent years whether on patrol, at social events, parades, speaking engagements, or in our schools helping to educate our students on safety matters. I would also like to recognize our volunteer firemen, auxiliary police and fire police on their efforts in keeping the safety and well-being of our citizens.

I would be remiss if I did not include our Department of Public Works employees under public safety. These are the men and women who are out on the streets doing the light work and heaviest work physically to keep our City safe and clean. They work in the subzero temperatures collecting trash, fixing water line breaks, or tree removal during storms and also in heat wave temperatures, sometimes with little recognition. Under Brad Rowles's leadership, they do a fantastic job with limited resources. Bill Parkhill and his staff should be recognized for the job they do with park maintenance. All our parks are kept in good shape and equipment closely monitored. We get many compliments especially about the foliage and flowers at Gateway Harbor Park. All of our Departments directly and indirectly affect public safety and should be recognized for their efforts.

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Economic development is an ongoing process in order to bring business, large and small, into the City. This also means jobs which we sorely need. Our downtown area along Webster Street is doing well, and is continuing to expand. Another restaurant, Canal Club 62 Tap and Eatery, is scheduled to open this spring, and there are more businesses for possible new stores being developed. In addition, our Community Development team, led by Director Mike Zimmerman, is working on our Brownfield Opportunity Area (BOA) which includes downtown, River Road, and Tonawanda Island. A lot of planning and implementing for a new vision is taking place.

The next phase of the Gratwick Park Marina area will be starting this spring. Dredging of all the slips has been completed and the next phase will include the installation of docks and amenities such as lights, sidewalks, and utilities making the docks available to boaters. It is anticipated the Marina will be open to all boaters this season. The completion of this project has the potential to bring many people to our waterfront area giving the City a certain percentage of restaurant sales and docking fees.

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The years have taken a toll on Oliver Street. It is obviously not the shopping and entertainment center it used to be. There is a lot to do to make this corridor something we can be proud of again. During Rob Ortt's administration we received \$200,000 to begin efforts to bring back Oliver Street. This is the same program used to revitalize Webster Street. Grants have been provided for façade improvements and inside building improvements, and some businesses are starting to take advantage of an opportunity to improve the appearances of their business. Oliver Street is becoming a main focus for improvement. I have started meeting with some business owners and will be attempting to meet with many more. We all know this area needs attention. In addition, I have already met with potential businesses that will join the expansion of Taylor Devices in the Buffalo Bolt Business Park which recently occurred.

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The Meadow extension has been completed due to the hard work of City Attorney, Shawn Nickerson, and City Engineer, Dale Marshall, after many years of negotiations and various obstacles. It's a very pleasant drive connecting our mid-city business district to Erie Avenue and the Walmart Super Center. Also, the renovation of the Durkee Bridge connecting River Road to Tonawanda Island and businesses such as International Fiber, Smith Boys and Taylor Devices has been completed making the span safe once again. This can help with the future development of the Island.

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The impact of tourism has been noteworthy. Over the last several years, the number of people coming to Gateway Harbor Park has been increasing. Many of our residents spend a lot of time there, but more and more people from other areas now come to Gateway to spend time and money at our businesses. Since I have spent two years at Gateway in a supervisory role, I have had the opportunity to talk to many people, especially boaters. Gateway Harbor has become a destination. The number of boaters has increased tremendously. These boats are from our area as well as from other cities, other states, and in some cases, other countries. If we want tourists, we need to be ready for them. As I observed events there and listened to suggestions, it is at some point in the next few years that some enhancements will need to be made. Upgrades in electrical power, including some lighting under the Delaware Bridge are needed. In addition, restroom facilities will need expansion with other amenities. I plan on initiating discussions to improve upon these concerns.

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Quality of life issues are important to our residents. We need to make sure North Tonawanda has activities for people of all ages to enjoy. Our Youth Center located in the Grant School building has activities on a nightly basis for children of all ages. These activities include sports, board games, electronic and computer games, dances and competitions for all youth. Tutoring is even available for students who want help with school work. Thanks to Patty Brosius, Superintendent of Recreation & Parks, and Alex Domaradzki, Supervisor of the Youth Center, the number of participants attending is increasing.

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We are working to promote the Arts in our community. Last year the Historic Carnegie Art Center received a grant for \$343,000. This is a City owned building which is also historic in nature. It is a building of dignity at first being our public library donated to us by Andrew Carnegie. It needs to be kept a cultural center. With the grant money received, renovations are being made to install a handicapped accessible entrance, handicap accessible bathrooms, as well as an elevator. In addition, other interior and some exterior amenities are being addressed. I have started discussions between the Carnegie Center officials, the Riviera Theater, and the Herschel Carousel Museum to promote ways of working together, supporting each other's work and making the community more aware of what they have to offer, including the use of the Carnegie building.

A major goal of mine is to bring entities together and promote good communication to better understand each other's mission and prevent duplication of services. Having spent 17 years on the North Tonawanda School Board affords me the knowledge of how the City and School District can work together to benefit the students and citizens. The City and School District officials meet regularly to discuss ways to help save money for our taxpayers. It is the same taxpayer who pays whether it's City or School tax, so we should work together. The schools are a major part of our City and that is one of the main things people with children look at when choosing where to live.

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The City of North Tonawanda has been fiscally sound over the past several years, and I will work to that same philosophy of maintaining a fiscally responsible budget. As we move forward, this administration will look for ways to operate City government in cost efficient ways, and will look for new ways to provide needed services. This year we will be negotiating contracts with some of our unions. We want to be fair to our employees who work hard for us; however, we also need to be fair to those who pay the bills —the taxpayers. We are in good financial shape right now, and my goal is to keep expenses in line while minimizing the impact on taxpayers.

We are striving to have all entities working together to keep the "mini renaissance" I spoke of earlier going further. We are showing that North Tonawanda can keep its many traditions and still move forward. I look forward to working with Senator Ortt, and other State and Federal officials, the Common Council, Department Heads, and citizens. This has been a very quick trip for me as Mayor, and I truly appreciate all the support I have received and continue to receive from everyone.

Proposal

The Boy Scouts of America, locally known as the Greater Niagara Frontier Council (GNFC-BSA) would like to propose a co-operative community venture with the City-of North Tonawanda on Sunday July 19, 2015 to be held at Gratwick Park.

Purpose of event

Basic Event Agenda

Preparation for the event at Gratwick Park on River Road would begin at 8:00 am Sunday 7/19/2015 which would include vendors, clubs and related displays. The event would officially begin at 1:00 and end at 4:00. The parking area for boat launch vehicles with trailers would be reserved for the boaters with permits issued by the City of North Tonawanda. Activity areas will temporarily but clearly marked during event. All displays will be temporary and most will be located along the park drive on the west side near boat launch area. Scouting's Leave No Trace principles will be actively enforced to preserve the beauty of Gratwick Park. A scouting display will be set up at the main entrance and the south entrance of the park promoting scouting at all levels. Displays will include but are not limited to flags, balloons, streamers, dining flies, signs or related items. All efforts will be made to keep vehicles parked in established parking areas. If these areas are full we will try to keep cars parked along the Gratwick Park roadway as close to the road as possible in an effort to preserve the grass. Vehicles transporting anyone with physical or developmental challenges will be a priority. Anyone vendor who provides food, refreshments or activities will clean up their area when done. The Boy Scouts will supervise the final clean up after the event.

- Frisbee demonstrations and lessons
- Possible participation from Mercy Flight
- Possible participation from the Niagara or Erie County Sheriff Air Unit
- Displays from the NT Police and Fire Departments would be an excellent addition
- Possible participation from the U.S. Coast Guard
- Possible participation from the U.S. Board Patrol
- The Girl Scouts will be invited to participate
- Local Scout Troops holding Hot Dog sale as a fundraiser
- Ice cream/refreshments or similar snacks with fees from local vendors
- Water, Ice Tea or Bug Juice (Kool-Aid) provided by BSA with local merchants support.

Requested City of North Tonawanda Participation

Our hope is that the City of North Tonawanda will grant the BSA the use of Gratwick Park, the pavilion and power source and any fresh water source available within the park and waive any fees. As well as any available safety traffic cones to mark prohibited parking and other areas of interest at no charge. Approval to post signs as needed in the park to mark activities and promote agenda. Police presence or participation for safety and

security purposes would be helpful, but not necessarily needed. GNFC-BSA will provide BSA trained first aid staff for any minor incidents.

We would request the North Tonawanda Fire Department & Police Departments have an interactive display set-up to educate the youth and adults as to what their departments do, and how we as citizens can be supporting members of the community towards their efforts.

The Boy Scouts of America thank you in advance for your support in this event. It will promote community goodwill and create a fun arena for the families in and around North Tonawanda. RE: Request for authorization to submit a grant application to the NYS Affordable Housing Corporation

Dear Honorable Body:

Currently, the Community Development Office does not have any active grant programs to assist home owners in North Tonawanda. In prior years, housing rehabilitation grant programs funded by grants from the New York State Office of Community Renewal have assisted in the repair of over 50 homes owned by low-income residents.

The New York State Affordable Housing Corporation Affordable Home Ownership Development (AHOD) Program provides grant funding to municipalities to provide grants for home improvement projects in homes owned by low and moderate income residents. The Community Development Office currently has a waiting list of over 40 interested home owners in need of home improvement assistance. If awarded, these grants would be available to home owners in U.S. Census Tracts 229.01, 230.01, 231, and 232 (see enclosed map) in accordance with program regulations. Home owner applications would be processed as they are received with priority given to homes with healthy and safety concerns, home owners with the greatest financial need, elderly residents, and residents with disabilities.

While the AHOD Program does not require a local funding match the Program is competitive and applications which leverage local funds have a better chance of being awarded. Based on the expenses incurred during previous programs, I recommend the City commit a minimum of \$50,000 in local funds to this Program if awarded. These funds would be used to cover required weatherization and lead paint testing for each home as well as the fees of a firm that specializes in housing rehabilitation management, to be procured through a competitive process, responsible for managing and inspecting each construction project.

Given the need for home improvement in North Tonawanda's low and moderate income neighborhoods, I respectfully request this Honorable Body to authorize the Community Development Office to submit a grant application to the New York State Affordable Home Ownership Development Program requesting \$400,000. In addition, I respectfully request this Honorable Body to approve of a cash match of \$50,000.


